MassCommute is a coalition of eleven Transportation Management Associations (TMAs) serving 39 municipalities, over 300 businesses and collectively represents over 280,000 commuters throughout the Commonwealth. Our overall goal has been to increase public awareness of key transportation issues and endorse a wide range of Transportation Demand Management (TDM) measures in Massachusetts.

This document highlights some of the key successes and accomplishments as well as the events and programs which demonstrate how the TMAs individually, and jointly as MassCommute, leverage public and private funds to increase the use of ridesharing and other commuting alternatives to reduce traffic congestion and improve air quality.

- Met with 8 members of MA Congressional delegation in Washington DC to promote transportation fringe benefit
- Worked with MassDEP officials to implement first round of changes to DEP Rideshare Regulation reporting
- Over 120 Massachusetts businesses and institutions were recognized at the 2nd Annual Excellence in Commuter Options (ECO) Awards Ceremony at the Federal Reserve Bank in Boston
- MassCommute's 19th Annual Bicycle Challenge attracted over 3,000 participants who collectively cycled nearly 143,000 miles during Bay State Bike Week
- 4,636 individuals celebrated the 2nd Annual Car-Free Week statewide, resulting in a reduction of approximately 724,488 vehicle miles traveled

On March 29, 2012 MassCommute co-hosted the 2nd annual Excellence in Commuter Options (ECO) Awards ceremony with the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) and MassRIDES, the statewide travel options program. The event was held at the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston where Transportation Secretary & CEO Richard Davey was on hand to recognize over 120 Commonwealth organizations who have excelled in engaging and encouraging their employees to travel by public transit, carpools, vanpools, or by bicycling or walking.

MassCommute, MassDOT and MassRIDEs actively support Massachusetts employers in their efforts to reduce congestion and greenhouse gas emissions by reducing drive-alone trips to work while encouraging employees to travel by public transit, carpools, vanpools, bicycle or walking. Employers who met the criteria for one of three levels of achievement - *Pacesetter*, *Leader* and *Pinnacle* – received TDM (Transportation Demand Management) Achievement Awards for outstanding performance. Five Spotlight Awards were also presented for Leadership in Sustainability, Leadership in Commuter Engagement, Leadership in Commuter Options, Leadership in Innovation, and the Rising Star to corporations whose efforts have exemplified how to incorporate sustainable transportation in the workplace.

The MassCommute Bicycle Challenge encourages Massachusetts residents to retry bicycling all over again, to commute and/or make other trips by bicycle. Participants pledged to ride during Bay State Bike Week from May 14th -20th. Over 3,000 riders on 225 teams commuted over 143,000 miles during the 18th annual event in 2012! At the Bike Bash, MassCommute recognized the outstanding employers, schools, and communities who took the challenge.

MassCommute in conjunction with MassDOT and MassRIDES celebrated Car-Free Week from September 17th to the 23rd. Massachusetts Car-Free Week is an extension of World Car-Free Day, an annual event which has quickly spread to over 1,000 cities in 40 countries around the globe. As part of Car-Free Week thousands in Massachusetts got out of their cars and chose a more sustainable mode of travel. Participants who went Car-Free or Car-Light were asked to track their "green" trips with NuRide, the nation's largest travel rewards and rideshare matching program.

Whether they biked, walked, teleworked, carpooled, vanpooled or took public transportation during Car-Free Week, participants who logged their green trips on NuRide were eligible to win great prizes. Five \$50 gift cards were awarded daily as well as three \$150 grand prizes.

MassCommute's promotion of Car-Free Week through its member TMAs led to close to 1,100 new participants in NuRide during the month of September 2012.

advocacy

In the winter of 2011, MassCommute submitted comments to MassDEP Commissioner Kimmell regarding the release of the Agency's Draft Action Plan for Regulatory Reform. We recommended including the Agency's Rideshare Regulation (310 CMR 7.16) and identified some measures to streamline the program's required reporting and surveying process including our proposal for an Expedited Reporting/Certification Process (ER/CP).

The Commissioner's Final Action Plan (released 5/12/12) included streamlining the Rideshare Reporting Requirement as a specific targeted regulatory reform. A rideshare stakeholders meeting was convened consisting of representatives from MassCommute, the TMAs, MassDOT, MassRIDES and businesses/organizations required to comply with the regulation. Opportunities to streamline the employer reporting and survey requirements were identified and MassCommute formally submitted a list of recommendations based on feedback from TMA member businesses. Many of the recommendations were approved and included in the 2012 reporting period. MassCommute will continue to work with DEP to address other recommendations not enacted and are preparing for the larger regulation review process that is scheduled to take place in 2013.





In addition to working with DEP, MassCommute was also active in 2012 as an advocate on several key transportation fronts. During last year's MBTA fare increase/service cuts hearings, MassCommute and the TMAs attended several public meetings to provide testimony urging T officials to reconsider certain aspects of their proposals and offer recommendations to deal with the agencies financial issues. In addition, many of the TMAs worked with their members to develop contingency plans in the event that certain cuts to services were made.

Members of MassCommute participated in the ACT Legislative Summit in Washington, DC in January 2012. Meetings were held with policy staff in the offices of: Senators Kerry and Brown and Representatives Capuano, Markey, Tsongas, Neal, Lynch, and Keating. A meeting was also held with Congressman McGovern to discuss his legislation to reinstate transit parity. ABC TMA on behalf of MassCommute hosted a press conference with Congressman McGovern in May 2012 to promote the need for action to reinstate parity in the transportation fringe benefit. ABC TMA member, Massachusetts General Hospital spoke at the event about the real impact the benefit has on helping attract more than 8,000 employees to use transit to get to work.

MassCommute also provided comments to Transportation Secretary Davey regarding MassDOT's Mode Shift Goal of tripling the share of bicycling, transit and walking trips in the Commonwealth. We offered our support for the goal and urged the Secretary to also consider vanpooling, carpooling and telecommuting as additional methods for reducing SOV trips. In particular we recommended the state implement a Capital Cost of Contracting (CCC) Vanpool Program. In December 2012, MassCommute learned that under MassDOT's direction, MassRIDES is moving forward with the process for implementing a CCC program for a mid-2013 launch.




